# When all else fails, Humanized Teaching is the way

hen students are at risk of failing and disengaging, the teacher's human consideration paves the way - that is looking at the students in a more humane perspective by leveraging all sorts of action to help them receive a passing grade or enhance their performance. But sometimes, it is not just giving all sorts of advice, encouragements, prevention, intervention and post-intervention programs, nor reinforcements that would help them succeed, but the teacher's presence and

tender loving care by making them feel that you are there, on their side, and together with them in finishing their journey of education. It is the teachers' ability to make the students experience how to become more humane and not just simply becoming human.
